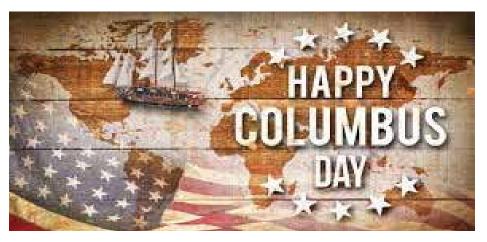

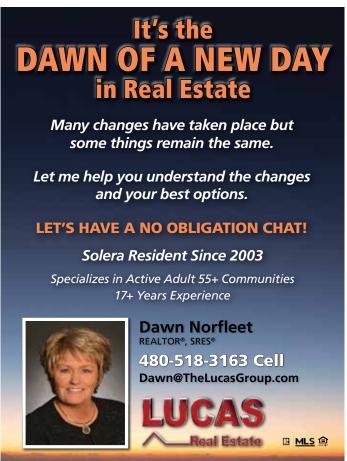

We are currently working on the budget for 2026. During the past 4 to 5 months Heather has been working on the budgets with some help from Richard, Jackie and myself. There are two budgets every year. The Operating Budget covers day to day operations of the community; the Reserve Budget is a list of our assets with their value and life expectancy that are due for replacement in the current year. The reserve study is done by a third party using their knowledge and experience of the assets in conjunction with input from us. Here at Solera, I'm always looking for helpful tips, tools, and resources to share with our homeowners, especially those that support safety and peace of mind in everyday life. One such resource is the Senior Lock Box Program, a thoughtful initiative offered by the City of Chandler.

This program provides qualifying residents with a secure lock box that allows emergency personnel to access your home quickly and safely during a crisis. In urgent situations—such as a medical emergency or fire—first responders may need immediate entry.

Who Qualifies for the Program?

To be eligible, you must meet one of the following criteria:

- · Be a City of Chandler resident aged 62 or older
- Live alone and have a chronic illness, fall risk, or history of emergency calls
- If living with someone, both individuals must meet the above health-related criteria
- Be referred by a Chandler Police Officer, Chandler Fire Department, or a medical professional

Additionally, the lock box must be able to hang on your screen door and be clearly visible to emergency personnel.

How to Register:

- 1. Go to https://chandlerazpd.gov/senior-lock-box-program to access the application.
- 2. Print and complete the form.
- 3. Contact one of the volunteers to submit your applica-

 - Blanca Quezada Email: Blanca.Quezada@chandleraz.gov I Phone: 480-782-4960
- 4. Your request will be reviewed by a program volunteer or specialist.
- 5. If approved, you'll be contacted on a Monday or Thursday to schedule your lock box installation.

This program is a wonderful way to enhance safety and provide peace of mind for our senior residents. If you or a loved one may benefit, I encourage you to take advantage of this free and valuable resource.

Notes and Observations

It's been yet another record summer of extreme temperatures in all of Arizona and our Solera vegetation continues to struggle. You may see evidence of plants and trees that have not made it through the months of August and September, an unfortunate condition that pervades many other communities yet again this year. It's been especially difficult seeing massive desert trees no longer standing due to the extreme winds of this year's summer season. Throughout Solera aging turf and plants have suffered greatly, due not only to the heat of summer, but the age of both to the extent their viability cannot be sustained. Consideration has been and will continue to be given these areas in the months to come.

That said, it's important Solera give strong consideration toward meeting the needs of our plants for water now and into the future. This is being accomplished by partnering with ProQual to re-plant drought tolerant landscaping options instead of 'water thirsty' plantings. But more research is needed with the intent of reducing our irrigation needs as we look toward the future.

If you're just coming out of your homes to have a serious look around your own landscaping, your Landscape Committee urges you to give consideration to replacing any plants and/or trees with water conserving ones. We stress again consulting the pamphlet "Landscape Plants for the Arizona Desert – Guide to Growing More Than 200 Low-Water-Use Plants". This publication can be found online at www.amwua. org/plants or by phoning the City of Chandler's Water Conservation Office at 480-782-3580. When planting or replanting any tree, remember to consult Solera's Design Guidelines for important information before you dig.

If you have not visited the Arboretum, you will be surprised at the diversity and beauty of the special areas and exhibits within the 320 acres of the gardens. The Arboretum's mission is the unity of conservation, research and education. Providing a deeper understanding and appreciation of the natural world is the aim of their educational programs. To enjoy it all, there are numerous activities for all ages to participate in, such as guided tours, bird walks, wellness workshops and many special seasonal events. Also serving as a living museum, the arboretum has plants from arid regions around the world.

Having spent a day walking some of the 4.7 miles of trails, we encountered so many beautiful landscape views. For example, there is a remarkable Australian Deserts Exhibit. This exhibit is a 10-acre homage to the unique biodiversity and culture of Australia's arid regions. And we were completely awed by "Mr. Big," a Red River Gum Eucalyptus tree. The tree was so large our size was minuscule next to it (see the photo). A visitor kindly volunteered to capture a photo of us next to the tree. The photo could never do justice to the size of the tree!

Getting relief from the heat of the sunny day on the trails, even though it was October, we ventured into a greenhouse of lovely rare and frost-sensitive succulents. Besides

the greenhouses, there are many other special exhibits and gardens to see, such as the Heritage Rose Garden, a Children's Garden, and a South American Deserts Exhibit, to name a few. One should definitely reserve more than one day for a meaningful visit.

Now is the election time of year! Please respect our fellow Solera neighbors as their opinions may differ from yours! All signs shall comply with state, county, or city

ordinances about when the sign can be placed on a lot and when it shall be removed. In Maricopa County signs may be displayed up to 60 days before an election and must be removed prior to 15 days after the election. Removing or altering a sign is a misdemeanor.

Freestanding flagpoles require Architectural Review Committee (ARC) approval. A freestanding pole cannot exceed 19 feet in height.

You may have up to two house mounted flag holders. They must be below the house roof line. The maximum number of flags that a homeowner may fly is three.

If you fly the American Flag, it must always be the highest flag. All flags must be maintained in "like new" condition. In other words, they must not be dirty or ripped.

If you fly the American flag at night, it must have white light directed at the flag. Lights for a flag require ARC approval.

Everyone is welcome to come to an ARC meeting! The October meetings will be October 8 and 22 at 1 pm in the SanTan Room.

Playing By the Rules

Documents Working Group

Would you play pickleball, tennis, mahjongg, head, foot and toe or any game at the community center without knowing the rules? Of course you wouldn't, and you probably wouldn't want to live in a community that didn't have rules either.

Our monthly board meetings represent rules in action. The meetings are conducted in a polite and business-like manner. Occasionally, feathers may be ruffled. Yet only rarely do strong disagreements become "hot-button" issues.

Perhaps you have experienced the thankfully rare board meeting when a particularly contentious and complicated issue commands the floor. Residents offer their strongly held opinions. It is understandable when some become impatient. It has happened that a resident challenged the board: "Look, here we are, why can't you just make a decision now?" The implication is that would be the democratic thing to do.

The boring answer is: Complicated issues are rarely solved by a simple yes or no. The board must legally follow the law especially on contentious issues. It cannot simply ignore the procedures and rules in our documents. In fact, such "off the cuff" decisions may overstep or countermand the board's responsibilities!

How Is Solera Governed?

It is important to understand the board is not a democratic body. Solera is an incorporated body. Our bylaws are those of a corporation. The board must follow its rules and regulations. Solera's Bylaws spell out the RULES that govern how the HOA operates and interacts through meetings and mailings with homeowners.

These legally binding rules are comprised of six Articles:

Article 1 - General Provisions

Article 2 - Meetings of Members

Article 3 - Board of Directors

Article 4 - Officers and Their Duties

Article 5 - Fines

Article 6 - Committees of the Board

The bylaws may be amended by a vote of the members provided they are approved by more than 50% of the votes entitled to be cast. In this case, that means more than 50%



of the 1,149 homeowners in Solera. And like other elections in Arizona, votes can be attained by both a vote of the members present and by absentee ballot.

Note: The board also has the authority to change the bylaws without a vote of the HOA members in order to comply with the rules and regulations of federal, state or local governmental agencies. As rules and laws change, so must our bylaws.

You can obtain a detailed explanation of each of these Articles by going to solerachandlerhoa.org. Select "Documents" at the top of the page, then "Governing Documents," and finally, "Amended and Restated Bylaws-03.21.2012". If you wish, you can opt to view the bylaws online, download them for future reference, or print them. You may also access this document from your smartphone or tablet: look for the menu (the three horizontal line symbol) and follow the same steps as above.

Solera's Bylaws are the primary mechanism that protects you as a homeowner and as someone who wishes to have the highest value of your home in this community. Lenders prefer certainty and legality. Knowing that not all rules can be broken (i.e. Solera must follow the law), makes your Solera home attractive to prospective new homeowners and lenders.

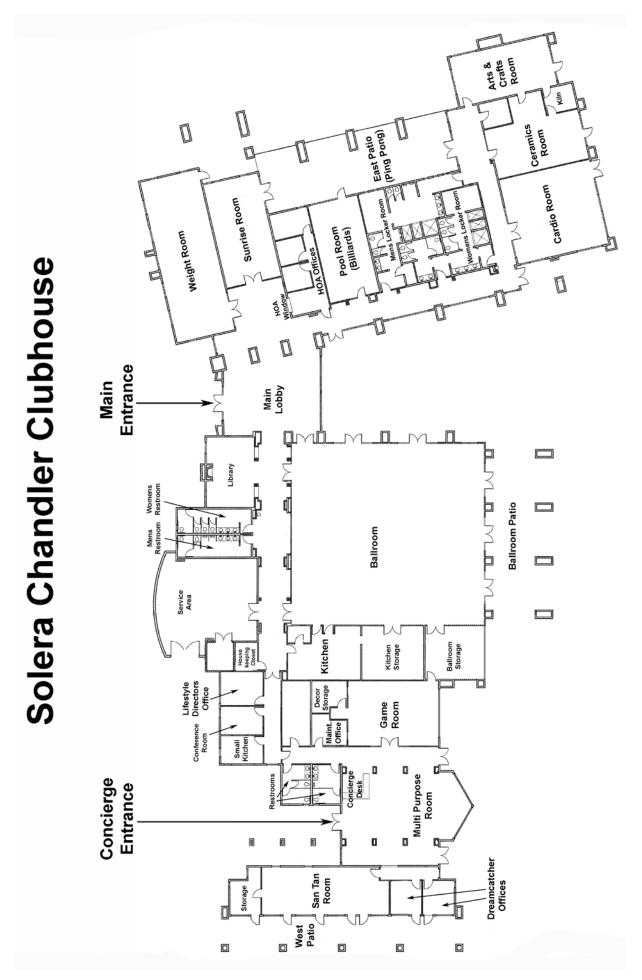

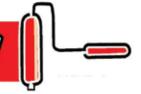

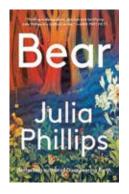
Book Discussion

Cribbage is a card/board game that involves playing and grouping cards in combinations to gain points and to move your peg 121 spaces for the win as you race to the finish without getting skunked.

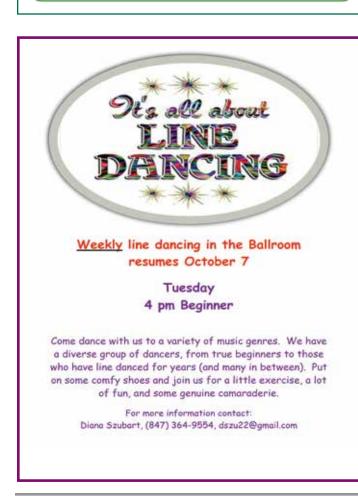
Part luck, part skill, usually played on one board by traditionally two players, it can be adapted for three or four players, depending on the total number of players and available boards.

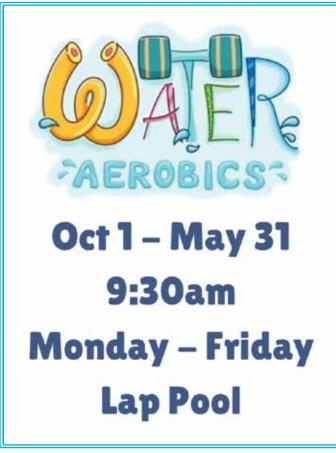

Thursday Hiking

The Thursday Hiking SIG will kickoff their 2025-2026 hiking season on October 30. Our initial scheduled hike will be at Lost Dutchman State Park. In November we will hike in Usery Mountain Park, San Tan Regional Park and South Mountain Park. November is also the start of the 100 miles in 100 days challenge in the Maricopa County Parks system. We have had several people from Solera complete the annual challenge.

For those who are new to Solera or may not be familiar with the Thursday Hiking SIG, below is a quick overview of our group.

Hikers meet at the Community Center at 7 am on Thursday to form carpools. Carpools leave at 7 am for the trailhead. Hiking season goes from late October to early April. Each hike has a suggested carpool rider fee to cover gas and park admission(if applicable).

Hikes are generally from five to seven miles. They will vary in elevation change from fairly flat hikes (300 ft total gain) to an occasional more challenging climb (1,000 ft of total gain). The average hike time is about $2 \frac{1}{2} - 3 \frac{1}{2}$ hours, including rest and photo breaks along the way. Overall time varies based on travel time to and from the trail and individual hiker speed. In most cases, we return to Solera around 12 pm or earlier. Hikes that are further from Solera (i.e. Scottsdale) will have a later return time. Details for individual hikes or any questions can be addressed to hikingsolera@gmail.com.

It is recommended that hikers bring the following on each hike:

- · Hiking shoes
- Hat
- Sunscreen
- · 2 liters of water
- Hiking poles
- · Snack for the break on the trail
- · Medical insurance card and identification

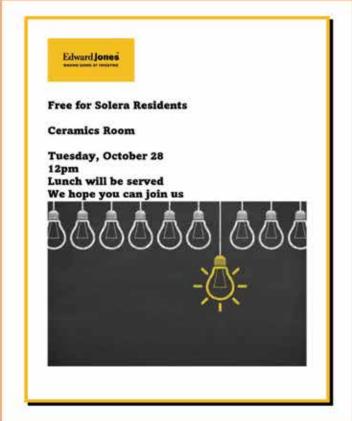

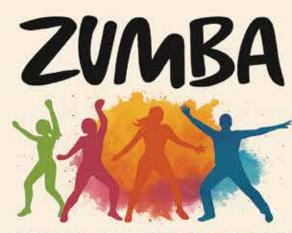

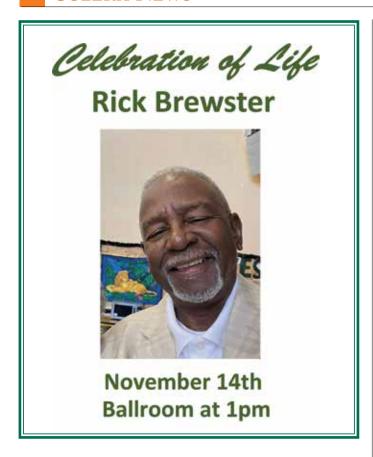

Wild About Horses

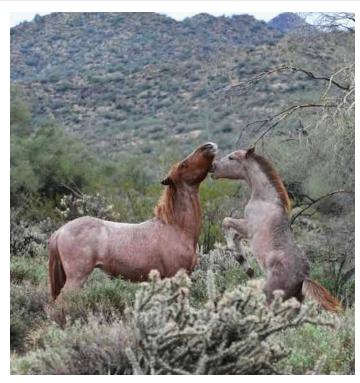

I discovered a love for ponies at the tender age of seven one summer when visiting an upstate New York aunt. To our delight, we found her barn was newly host to a small herd of ponies — just my size. Although not able to ride them, I quickly found a favorite called Dapples that I was allowed to feed directly from my hand. Dapples would continually nudge me, always hungry for more. This was a young city girl's dream. Having kept that affection for ponies as I was growing up, I was fortunate to horseback ride with friends through my teens and early 20s. But, work and college kept me busy until arriving in Arizona.

I attended my first rodeo in Payson after retiring to Arizona. It was very easy to recall my fondness for horses, marveling at their strength, beauty and sheer majesty. Recently a friend shared photos of the wild horses at the Lower Salt River. This habitat, consisting of 20,000 acres of Forest Service land, hosts as many as 300 horses roaming in families called bands. Many were brought to Arizona by non-indigenous Americans in the 19th century. By 1890, Maricopa County's open range had more than 4,000 horses.

Today there is a Salt River Wild Horse Management Group (SRWHMG). With its 100 volunteers the group watches





over the wild horses, allowing them to live and wander peacefully. In 2015, the horses were threatened with removal, and tens of thousands of Arizonans spoke out in their favor. As a result, the Arizona Legislature passed the Salt River Horse Act in 2016. At one point, the Arizona Department of Agriculture issued a Request for Proposal that required the removal and adoption of three healthy

adult horses for every foal born. This violated the Salt River Horse Act and had the potential to decimate the herd.

However, the SRWHMG is now successfully managing the herd humanely, and the program is nationally recognized as the most successful of its kind. Even so, it remains a never-ending financial battle for this group of volunteers as well as for the continuing humane treatment of all wild horses. As a result, the group is always open for donations.

Maricopa Title Alert is a free, easy-to-use service that allows you to take a proactive step against title fraud and the recordation of unlawful documents. The service can monitor multiple personal names and business names - and owning property isn't a requirement. All you need is a current email address!

How it Works:

When you subscribe to Maricopa Title Alert, you'll receive a notification through email or text when a document is recorded under any name you are monitoring. You'll then have a chance to review the recorded document.

If you believe that fraud has been committed, you can report your findings to the Attorney General and local law enforcement agencies.



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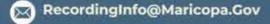
